

It's a fun way to connect, learn, and get to know each other better. We are welcoming our remote readers from




Image shows two coffee cups, one with the Audio-Reader logo.

## Tips for Reading

Read with the Listener in mind.

When we share conversation with colleagues, friends, and community members, our perspective and our voice is often friendly and engaging. When reading, imagine the listener as you read. Our founder, Anne "Petey" Cerf, first read to a friend; that is the perspective as we read. When you visualize the person listening, it changes the way you read. We read "for understanding" offering a pace and phrasing style that allows the meaning of the words to be brought forth.

No matter the content - we do not show bias. The listener should not discern the reader's opinion on the content. We are sharing information as written. We do not provide commentary.

As the political season continues, it is a good time for the reminder. We are the eyes and not the brain. There may be opinion pieces, or letters to the editor, which are part of your assignment. Read those as you would any other.

We are working on a Voter's Guide for our listeners; it will be available soon.

If you have time for an extra read, let us know as it is an extensive project.




Image shows an illustration of a brain with the words "We are the eyes and NOT the brain written over it"

Audio Description

Would you like to be an Audio Describer?



During a live audio description event, the trained describer sits in the back of the theater, often in the booth, with a microphone connected to a transmitter. Their job is to translate visual elements of the performance to listeners who then hear that description through individual receivers connected to headphones.

For a person who is visually impaired, this offers increased engage and enjoyment of the performance because they are clued in to the scenery, costume, and non-audio events that are occurring throughout the show. Imagine a scene where an actor is sneaking on stage to surprise another performer. The describer would be able to explain that to non-sighted audience members, including them in the secret too.



October - Vision Awareness Month
Join us October 11, 10:00am to 2:00pm

Each October Audio-Reader celebrates it first broadcast on October 11, 1971. On that day, our first volunteer broadcasters sat down to read and now, more than 5 decades later, we continue to provide



daily readings of local news, information and entertainment.

In the early days, we were only On Air for 80 hours a week. Audio-Reader's content has expanded to 24 hours a day, seven days a week through our traditional radios, the Lions Telephone Reader service, Alexa-enabled devices, accessibility apps, and streaming live and on-demand on our website.

This year we are celebrating with a focus on vision awareness. The Foundation Fighting Blindness has a campaign that includes an educational website dedicated to bringing awareness to <u>types of vision loss</u> and also the <u>stories of individuals with vision loss</u>. At Audio-Reader, we will have information available on October 11 from 10:00 to 2:00. Of course, we will also have birthday cake and coffee to share. Join us. In November, we will also have guests from the National Federation of the Blind-KS visiting Audio-Reader following their convention.




Image shows the Vision Viewer, a tool provided by Foundation Fighting Blindness that is an interactive way to share an image that best resembles a particular type of vision loss.
